The resulting artworks were intended to form a comprehensive documentary record, respectful both of history and art, and accurate in all details. Official instructions required each artist to produce paintings in specific quantities and sizes.

Red Rose Ranch – Veterans Horse Camp Inc. delivers horsemanship training and ranch life experiences to Military, First Responders, and Veterans who strive for improvement; physically, mentally, and spiritually.

#### Vision:

Our purpose is to share our knowledge of horsemanship with the Military, First Responder, and Veteran community. Our position is to preserve our community heritage, be present in the equine industry, and be community leaders.

Through discipline, humility, and self-ownership, our unique attribute is that we can train, communicate, and assist the Military, First Responder, and Veteran community because our staff are Military, First Responders, and Veterans. Through our shared experiences, we can build bonds quickly and ensure the success of our participants.

Red Rose Ranch – Veterans Horse Camp Inc. is its own not-for-profit organization registered under The Corporations Act with a focus on assisting our Military, First Responder, and Veteran Community. We are supported through a team of volunteers and sponsors to make this camp possible.

We created the Red Rose Ranch Veterans Horse Camp Inc. because building a relationship with horses has been the cornerstone of our physical, mental, and spiritual wellbeing.

The five day camp is designed to provide the learner with the knowledge, techniques and skills required to understand basic riding, horse care, and stable requirements. The camp will expose the benefits of horsemanship with our Military, First Responder, and Veteran community in the hopes of teaching a new skill with amazing residual effects of stress-reduction, anxiety control, and goal setting. The learner will receive one-on-one assistance and feedback from experienced instructors and facilitators, who are also Military, First Responders and Veterans.

The conditions on the ranch are authentic. Participants sleep in the bunkhouse or barn loft and use outdoor toilets. There is running water, but it is not heated. The food is hearty ranch food, such as chili, potatoes, salads, biscuits, and pies, and there is a lot of it. The intent is to create an environment where participants build bonds with their teammates and learn the raw responsibilities of ranch life through discipline, humility, and self-ownership.

The Navy League Cadet program aims to help young Canadians learn life skills including citizenship, teamwork and self-discipline. Our programming is designed to help cadets become more aware of the world around them, become self-sufficient and confident in what good leadership looks like, how to work together, and how to overcome challenges. Youth leave the program with a genuine interest in their community's well-being and equipped with skills to become active citizens.

#### 1977 - THE LEGION FUNDS NATIONAL TRACK AND FIELD

In keeping with the Legion's commitment to our youth, funds were allocated for National Track and Field camps starting in 1977. Funds are still being allocated, with planning of future camps commencing five years in advance. Since 1977 the Legion has invested millions of dollars to hold national annual track and field camps to provide training and competition at the national level for young track and field athletes. The camps provide these youths opportunities to mix with other athletes, coaches and chaperones from all parts of Canada.

In addition to a national commitment, local Legion Branches, in concert with their Provincial Commands, bid for the right to host this event. Brandon Branch 003 hosted it in 2017 and 2018. Note the signatured mural on the west clubroom wall, athletes who attended in 2017, gifted the Branch with this amazing keepsake.



### FEBRUARY Facts &/Or FICTION?

THE FULL SNOW MOON

February's full Moon reaches peak illumination on Saturday, February 24, 2024. Look skyward on that night to catch the best view of this full Moon!

It's known as the Snow Moon due to the typically heavy snowfall that occurs in February. Other traditional Native American names for this Moon include the Eagle Moon (Cree), Raccoon Moon (Dakota), and Hungry Moon (Cherokee).



The Farmers' Almanac uses a mathematical and astronomical formula to make our long-range weather predictions, not folklore. We look at sunspot activity, tidal action of the Moon, positions of the planets, and many other factors to carefully craft a year's worth of weather forecasts. Fans of the Almanac say our weather forecasts are accurate 80-85% of the time.

The western zodiac signs in February are <u>Aquarius</u> which is until February 19<sup>th</sup>, and <u>Pisces</u>, which is until <u>February</u> 20<sup>th</sup>.

The length of February was finalized when Julius Caesar remade the Roman calendar and assigned the month 28 days and 29 days. In 713 B.C., February was officially added to the Roman calendar.



In the Northern Hemisphere, February is the third month of winter. Meanwhile, in the Southern Hemisphere, February is the last month of summer. Between the North and South Hemispheres, February is the equivalent of August.

February is the only month where it's possible to go the entire time without having a full moon.

A full moon occurs every 29.5 days, which is known as the lunar calendar.

So as the years go on, it is possible for February to miss a full moon.

This is known as a "black moon" instead of a snow moon, and one occurs around every 19 years, the last of which occurred in 2018.

A snow moon can only occur in <u>February</u>, and if there isn't one, then the moon in February is known as a black moon.

When this occurs, both January and March have two moons, and the term snow moon isn't used.
