



IMPERIAL WAR GRAVES COMMISSION AND VETERANS' PLOT (CONTINUE FROM PAGE 11, February 2025 Legionnaire Newsletter.

Up to the time of the formation of the Legion, the members of the Great War Veterans Association in Brandon had looked after the war graves on a casual basis. With the formation fo the Legion and the erection of the Cross of Sacrifice, along with the growing number of verterans' graves in the plot, a more determined effort was made. Peonies were planted between the graves and the annual clean-up by members of the Legion was organized and continue to this day. The Branch took over collecting the small amount paid for war graves from the Imperial War Graves Commission. On the return of the Constitution to Canada the I.W.G.C. is now know as the Canadian War Graves Commission. By this time the Cross had become known locally as the Cenotaph.

A suggestion was made at a General meeting of the Branch in June 1957 that the Branch should install floodlights at the Cenotaph. This suggestion was immediately taken up and the Chairman of the Cemetery Committee at that time, Comrade Mike Shernisky, was instructed to proceed with the project. Through his efforts, Mike was able to obtain the support of the local gas company for the trenching necessary to lay the line from the Hydro line, following which he got assistance from Hydro for the cable and laying of same. The project was completed at a very minimal cost to the Branch. The dedication service of the lights was held on September 23, 1957.

In January 1958 Comrade Gordon Gray took over as Chairman of the Cemetery Committee and asked permission to explore the possibility of erecting wrought iron fencing and Memorial gates at the plot. He was instructed to look into the matter and if feasible, to proceed with the project. By the end of April Comrade Gray had all the required information and at the Branch meeting of May 8, 1958, a committee was formed to proceed with the project. This committee made little headway and it wasn't until the following year that the final committee was named, including Judge Buckingham, Mayor Creighton, Col. Whitehead, J.B.Craig, Steve Magnacca, Maurice Donovan, John English and Laurie Smith. This Committee held several meeting and various small fund raising events were undertaken.

By May 11, 1961 things were ready to proceed except for one thing—no one had drawn up a design. The completion of the project dragged on until the spring of 1962 when Comrade Dave Weiss and Comrade Ted Higgens donated the bricks for the gate post, and on June 10, 1962 at 3:00 p.m. dedication of the gates took place. Only a portion of the fencing had been completed at this time.

In 1961 it was decided to purchase 500 porelain crosses to be used to mark the graves on Decoration Day Ceremonies. These have been added to several times since then.

The maintenance of this plot is the full responsibility of the Legion, working with the city maintenance crew. The Branch purchased a power mower in 1976 and this was donated to the City Works Department on the agreement that they would keep the grass mowed in the veterans' plot.

During the years some help has been hired to maintain the plot but work is mostly on a volunteer basis.

Early in 1975 it was suggested that more space would soon be needed. The city was approached with a request to include the area of the cemetery directly south of the Veterans' plot and this was agreed to in October 1976.

In 1983 arrangements were made through the Deptment of Veterans Affairs to have the Cross cleaned, up to this time the Branch had taken this responsibility. The work done by the local contractor E.C Higgins and Sons was paid for through Public Works on behalf of the Department of Veterans Affairs and the Canadian War Graves Commission.

From the small beginning in 1931 of 37 graves to November 1, 1984 the plot has grown to contain, 781 graves as well as the original scattered in other parts of the cemetery.

March's full **Blood Worm** Moon reaches peak illumination at 2:55 A.M. ET on Friday, March 14, 2025.

Of course, you don't have to wait until the middle of the night to see the Moon! Look for the spectacularly bright Moon as it rises above the horizon on Thursday evening. If your weather is poor on Thursday night, try again on Friday! See when the Moon will be visible in vour area.





The first true proponent of Daylight Saving Time was an Englishman named William Willet. A London builder, he conceived the idea while riding his horse early one morning in 1907. He noticed that the shutters of houses were tightly closed even though the Sun had risen. In "The Waste of Daylight," the manifesto of his personal light-saving Willet campaign, wrote. "Everyone the evenings. appreciates long, light Everyone laments their shrinkage as the days grow shorter, and nearly everyone has given utterance to a regret that the nearly clear, bright light of an early morning during Spring and Summer months is so seldom seen or used.... That so many as 210 hours of daylight are, to all intents and purposes, wasted every year is a defect in our civilization. Let England recognize and remedy it."

Attitudes changed after World War I began. The government and citizenry recognized the need to conserve coal used for heating homes. The Germans were the first to officially adopt the light-extending system in 1915 as a fuel-saving measure during World War I. This led to the introduction in 1916 of British Summer Time: From May 21 to October 1, clocks in Britain were put an hour ahead.
